

A tale of two cities

Consumer Choice compares the cost of some everyday services used by Dublin and Belfast consumers.

The results make for interesting reading.

It has been well established that retail goods such as groceries are cheaper in Northern Ireland than they are in the Republic. Our own research last year confirmed this point when we found that, excluding VAT rates, retail goods were over 20% cheaper in Northern stores than they are in their Southern equivalents. And one only has to look at the southern registered cars that fill the car parks of Northern Ireland's shopping centres to see that consumers from this side of the border have been taking advantage of the lower prices. But what about prices charged in the non-retail sector - are these lower too? We decided

to find out by comparing costs of some everyday services in the two capital cities.

Plumbers

Consumer Choice called a random sample of plumbers to obtain quotes for getting the annual service on a standard gas boiler in current working order. When we called five plumbers who operate in the Dublin area, we were quoted anything from between €90 and €110 inc. VAT at 13.5%. When we called Belfast providers with the same request, the average cost was €63 after the sterling price was converted back into euros. This included the current UK VAT rate of 15%. Overall,

quotes for Dublin contractors were over 33% more expensive on average. When VAT rates are stripped out, the difference is almost 35%.

Dentists

For dentists, we again called a random sample and asked how much a routine dental examination and polish would cost. Dublin based dentists quoted us between ϵ 70 and ϵ 140. Dentists based in the Belfast area quoted between ϵ 53 and ϵ 91. These are final prices as dental costs are VAT exempt in the UK & Ireland. Overall, based on our survey, Dublin consumers are charged an extra ϵ 28, or

29% more than those getting the same procedure in Belfast.

The difference in price is probably not too surprising as there has been much anecdotal evidence of Southern consumers travelling to Northern Ireland for dental implants, crowns, root canals and veneers. And under the Treatment Benefit Scheme, consumers who have the necessary PRSI contributions can reclaim some of the cost of certain dental treatments – including treatment carried out in another EU state (see *Useful contacts* for more details).

Mechanics

When comparing mechanics, *Consumer Choice* contacted a random sample of garages and requested quotations for the cost of a car service. We asked for the price of a standard service on a 2001 1.6 litre Ford Focus with 80,000 miles on the clock. On average, we found that it cost over €100 more to have the car serviced in Dublin than it would in Belfast. This represents a difference of over 45%. When the relevant VAT rates are stripped out of the quotations, Dublin consumers are actually paying 47% more according to the prices we were quoted.

Driving instructors

When comparing the cost of driving instruction, we compared the cost of a 1hour lesson for both Dublin and Belfast providers. In our survey, we found that on average it costs €10 or 25% more for an hour's driving instruction in Dublin than in Belfast. When VAT rates are stripped out, the differential rises to 27%. However, Dublin consumers can take comfort from the fact that despite the price having almost doubled in the recent budget, the cost of taking the driving test itself is cheaper south of the border. In Dublin, a standard driving test costs €75. In Belfast, it costs almost 30% more at €105.

Chiropractors

Consumer Choice also surveyed chiropractors for the cost of an initial consultation. Chiropractors operating out of Dublin gave us an average quote of €66. However, after converting currencies, the average cost of a consultation for a Belfast based chiropractor was €16 cheaper, at €50. This equates to almost 25% less overall. The provision of chiropractic treatment by a registered chiropractor is exempt from VAT in both Dublin and Belfast.

Our survey is not exhaustive, and only represents a small sample, but it does seem that Dublin consumers pay significantly more for professional services than those in Belfast. Taken overall, the Dublin quotations we were given were about 30% higher than those for Belfast, so it is not just groceries that are cheaper north of the border. Of course, behind every North-South price survey there are many variables which cannot be accounted for. These include tax rates, rents and levels of income. But can these really account for such large price differentials? Well, in relation to the difference in the price of retail goods it seems that question is slowly but surely being answered. It was recently revealed by *The Irish Times* that Tesco's profit margins are over 50% higher in the Republic than they are elsewhere. Could the same be true for services as well?
